From our eyes

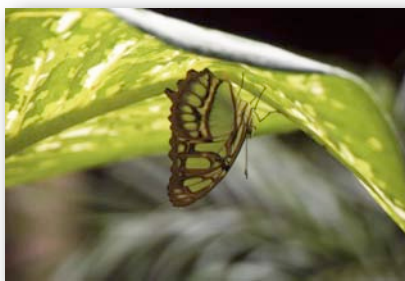

Butterflies don't just prefer sunny days. They need sunlight in order to regulate their body temperature. Whether it is raining or not, when the sun is obscured or the sun sets, butterflies fly for cover immediately.

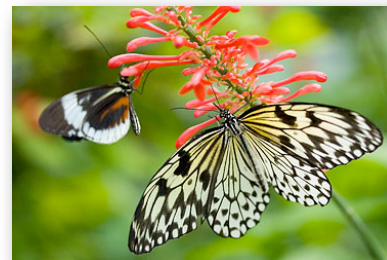
Just as human beings might duck for cover underneath

the canopy of a tree, butterflies seek the protection of natural coverings. According to Rudi Mattoni, editor of the *Journal of Research on the Lepidoptera*, the favorite resting sites include the undersides of leaves



or stems of bushes and on blades of grass.

Butterfly bodies are exceedingly delicate, so nature has provided them with other kinds of protection against the rain. When resting, the teardrop configuration of the butterfly prevents rain from pooling on the wings or body, and the surfaces of the butterfly's skin do not absorb water.



Richard Zack, curator/director of the James Entomological Collection at Washington State University, adds that many butterflies could not survive flying during a rain storm. Not only does wind wreak havoc with their ability to fly, but the big raindrops themselves would pose a major risk.

WEEDS? WHAT WEEDS?

Well, it's been a difficult spring and early summer for our poor plants, thanks to this incredible lack of rain. However, the Lambs Quarters seem to be doing all right, thanks to their hardiness and ability to grow in waste grounds. This plant, sometimes called smooth pigweed is



one of our most enduring annual weeds producing a tremendous amount of seeds that are able to survive dormant in the soil for decades. Most people definitely consider this a weed. However, they're delicious! And nutritious!

Lambs Quarters have many beneficial qualities, including:

- American Indians ate the leaves to treat stomachaches and to prevent scurvy. They made a leaf poultice to treat burns.
- The tender leaves and tips are excellent steamed or boiled for 10-15 minutes.
- The highly nutritious seeds can be boiled to make a breakfast gruel or can be ground into flour.
- This plant, a close relative of spinach, also is good to eat. The young shoots may be cooked and eaten like asparagus. It is richer in vitamin C than spinach, far richer in vitamin A and, though not quite so rich in iron and potassium, is still a good source of these minerals. It is exceptionally rich in calcium.



Please research all plants before using them, and NEVER pick and eat anything without first consulting an herbalist or a qualified plant guide. Always be aware of whether the area you are gathering from may have been sprayed with chemicals.

Keep an eye on the website for the 2007-2008 Program. Things will be updated soon.

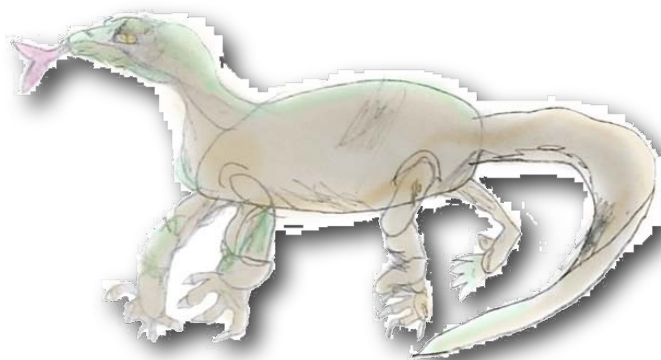
